English



Writing to Inform: *Planetarium* Non-chronological report

- Plan and structure information into logical sections with clear headings
- Use present tense and formal, factual language consistently
- Write an introduction and conclusion that frame the report effectively

Writing to Entertain: *Gargoyles* Narrative

- Craft vivid settings and characters using precise noun phrases and powerful verbs to create atmosphere
- Structure a complete narrative with an engaging opening and a build-up of tension

Science



Forces

- Explain how gravity pulls unsupported objects towards the Earth
- Identify the effects of air resistance, water resistance and friction on moving objects
- Investigate levers, pulleys and gears

Evolution and Inheritance

- Recognise that fossils show change over time
- Explain that variation affects survival
- Explore how adaptations lead to evolution

Computing



Computing Systems and Networks: Systems and Searching

- Explain how data is transferred between devices within a system.
- Describe the input, process and output of real-world systems.
- Explore how search engines select and rank results.

Maths



Number & Place Value: Read, write, order and compare numbers up to 10,000,000, rounding to any degree of accuracy.

Multiplication & Division: Multiply and divide up to 4-digit numbers using formal written methods.

Addition & Subtraction: Add and subtract whole numbers with more than 4 digits using columnar methods.

Fractions: Simplify, compare and order fractions (including those greater than 1); add/subtract fractions with different denominators; multiply pairs of proper fractions and divide fractions by whole numbers.

RE



Beliefs & Practices

- Describe the key features of worship, pilgrimage, and life-cycle rituals within different religions.
- Make connections between practices across worldviews, identifying similarities and differences.
- Reflect on the significance of celebrations and rituals, considering their impact on believers' lives.

PSHE



Being Me in My World

- Understand rights, responsibilities, rewards and consequences in school and community
- Explore how behaviour affects groups and how democracy gives everyone a voice.

Celebrating Difference

- Recognise cultural differences, racism and types of bullying, and understand conflict
- Appreciate other cultures and reflect on how material wealth relates to happiness

PE



Basketball

- Pass, dribble and shoot accurately.
- Attack and defend to create chances.
- Move into space to support teammates.

Parkour

- Run, jump, balance and roll with control
- Link moves to clear obstacles.
- Adapt speed and direction for different terrain.

Geography



Mapping the Local Area.

- Use 4- and 6-figure grid references and the 8 points of a compass to locate and describe places on OS maps.
- Interpret symbols, keys and scale on Ordnance Survey maps to identify physical and human features.
- Apply these map-reading skills to explore routes and patterns in Northwood, London, and extend to the wider UK.

Talk and Write about Yourself

- Ask and answer questions about name, age, location, pets and family.
- Describe yourself and others using colours and simple adjectives.

- Recap key phrases from previous learning to talk about yourself.
- Write a short paragraph introducing yourself

Music



Shaping Music

- Improvise freely over a drone or groove
- Compose a short ternary piece using Music Notepad.

Unlocking Vocal Potential

- Sing with accurate phrasing, pitch and style.
- Perform in two or three parts as an ensemble.

Art/DT



Benin Art

- Draw Benin-style patterns and faces
- Sculpt clay reliefs using coiling, slab and carving.
- Finish sculptures with smoothing and surface detail..

Festive Microbits

- Program a Microbit to control lights and buzzers.
- Build and connect a simple electrical circuit with switches and outputs.

History



The Benin Empire c. AD 900–1300

- Locate the Kingdom of Benin on a map and place it on a timeline.
- Describe the religion, culture, art and social structures of the Benin civilisation.
- Compare the Benin Empire with a contemporary British society (e.g. Anglo-Saxons) and evaluate different historical sources.

Home Learning



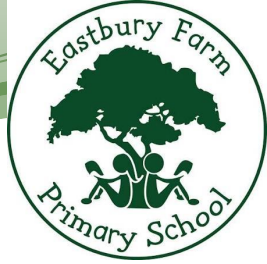
- A **Doodle Maths** and a **Doodle Reading** task, set by teachers on **Thursday** and due to be completed by the following **Tuesday**.
- Last week, we completed a **baseline assessment** which should tailor the level of difficulty when children practise in the **Doodle learning zones**.
- In addition to the teacher set tasks, we expect the children to do Doodle activities to '**stay on green**'.

Home Learning



- To 'stay on green', we encourage a '**little and often**' approach: a personalised pathway so the **algorithm** learns each child's level and pitches learning tailored to them.
- We will remind children how to find their **personalised pathway** and how to access tricky questions and **tutorials** when stuck.
- Parents are encouraged to download the **parent app** to track progress.
- There will be an **online parent workshop** on Tuesday 22nd October, 2.30-3.00pm. Look out for Miss Workman's newsletter for further details.
- Children must be in the **green zone** by Thursday evening.
- Mrs Cachra presents the **Doodle Trophy** on **Fridays** to the class with the most children in the green zone.

Reading Records

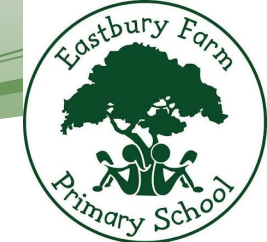


- Children will read their stage books or a book of their choice if a Free Reader.
- Expectations are for the children to read a **minimum of three times a week** - if more than this, even better.
- **Reading Records** are checked **once a week** and house points and/or DOJOs awarded if there is good evidence of reading.

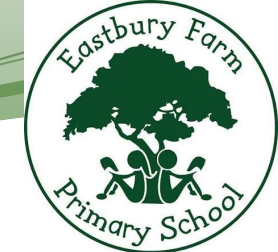

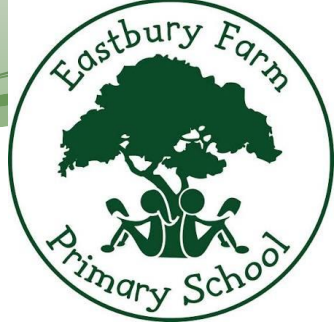
EASTBURY FARM PRIMARY SCHOOL UNIFORM CODE 2026-27

A 50% discount on items with logos is offered to children eligible for Pupil Premium Funding.



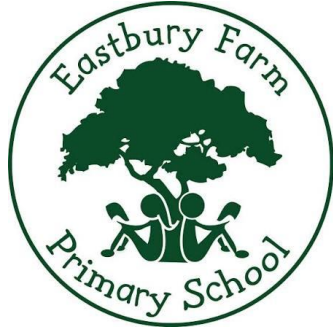

Further Guidelines
• All uniform must be named, clean and in good repair • Art aprons for all pupils are provided by the school • Children may bring a reasonably sized rucksack of their choice, an optional green backpack with school logo is available from Watford School Uniforms for children in the Nursery, Reception and KS1 • Water bottles must be transparent and re-usable with a sports cap that can be closed easily • Suitable sun hats are required for the warmer months • Nail varnish and make-up must not be worn and will be removed if worn. Nails must be kept short • Long hair must be tied back using only green or black hair bands and clips. Large bows and hair accessories are not permitted • Hairstyles must be neat, smart and appropriate for school. Patterns must not be shaved onto heads and hair must not be gelled into spikes or unusual shapes. Dyed hair is not permitted. • Watches are allowed but must be removed for P.E. and swimming (no watches with internet connection) • If earrings are worn, they must be studs which must be removed or taped over for P.E. and swimming (parents must provide tape) • No other jewellery is permitted • The school respects cultural dress and the uniform may be modified accordingly in consultation with the Headteacher. Headscarves must be dark green. • If any pupil arrives at school dressed inappropriately, the Headteacher reserves the right to send the child home to change • School uniform with logos and the school tie is supplied by Watford School Uniforms and can be purchased in person at the shop or online: Watford School Uniforms Sustainable. Ethical. Affordable. • All non-branded items are also available to buy at Watford School Uniforms and special 'bundle' deals are available

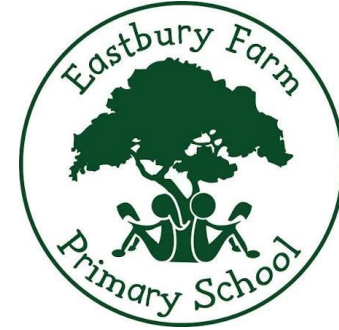

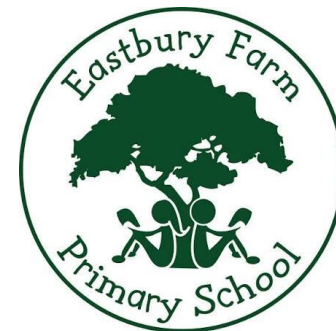
Everyone at Eastbury Farm Primary School

- Learn from our mistakes

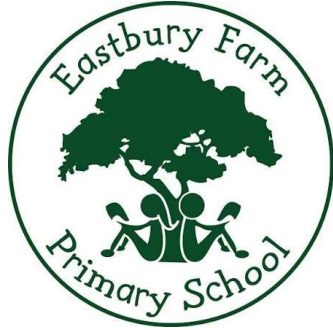
